The Pandemic Population Conversations engages Extension 4-H and military services staff and volunteers in discussions while reading *The Pandemic Population* (2020) by Dr. Tim Elmore. In sharing together, staff and volunteers discover strategies and supports for working with military-connected youth in the current circumstance of the pandemic and beyond.

Overview

Session 1 is an introductory session as your cohort had not received the book prior to the session and, therefore, spent time exploring introductory concepts of generational influences, generation z, and individual goals for the session.
